FAITH IN JESUS CHRIST

Mark's Gospel account today is built on a double astonishment or amazement: the neighbors and family of Jesus are astonished that he taught in the synagogue with wisdom and worked powerful signs. Jesus, in turn, is amazed that they have no faith in him because they know his origins, not because of any fault with his teaching or ministry. As with many of Mark's passages, we get a rather intimate glimpse here of the human part of Jesus' two-fold nature. To reinforce his point, Mark tells of Jesus' return to his native place, and further points out that he is in the midst of his own family members there. From the very people he expected the most, Jesus received the least. In the day of the Gospel's writing, Mark was attempting to illustrate a lesson to the house of Israel: the God of the covenant expected the greatest faith from the house of Israel, but often received the least. This is a good source for reflection on our part, we who are Jesus' followers today. For the wisdom of Christ to continue and for our lives to be seen as signs of his power, he must expect and be able to find great faith among us. Will he? Can he? Does he? Or is he, once again, amazed by its absence?

Born in Corinaldo in 1890 the second child of six children born to a farmer. she raised her brothers single handed following the death of her father. Aged 11 she took her First Holy Communion. She was raped by a young man who had become obsessed with her. She resisted and was fatally stabbed; she died on 6th July 1902 a day after the attack. On her deathbed she forgave her murderer. She was proclaimed a saint by Pope Pius XII in 1950.

Statement on the U.S. Supreme Court Ruling in Obergefell v. Hodges Most Reverend José H. Gomez Archbishop of Los Angeles June 26, 2015

The Supreme Court's decision is not a surprise. But it is disappointing and troubling.

The Court expresses some beautiful and true thoughts about the "transcendent" purposes of marriage and the importance of marriage as a "keystone" of our social order. The Court acknowledges that marriage has existed "for millennia and across civilizations."

So it is hard to understand how the Court can feel so assured that it has the power to discard and rewrite the definition of marriage that has existed since the beginning of history — as the lifelong union of one man and one woman.

This decision reflects a deep confusion about the meaning of marriage, the family and the human person; about individual liberty; and about the role of the courts and legislatures in our democratic system of self-government.

By their nature, court decisions cannot really resolve social questions that are rooted in deeply held values, history, and tradition. So the public conversation and debate about marriage will continue.

As Catholics living in this democracy, our first duty always is to love and to reflect the mercy of God to all of our neighbors.

Let us go forward in charity, confident in Jesus Christ and the truths of the Gospel. Let us continue to promote the dignity of all men and women, who are made in the image of our Creator and endowed with a transcendent value and destiny.

Let us continue to work for the good of our society and to create a culture of life and love. Remember that holy lives, good marriages, and strong families can change the world.

Should we confess sins of the past?

I keep reading that people with scrupulosity shouldn't confess sins from the past they're sure they confessed, but is that true for the general population?

Scrupulosity is religion-based obsessive-compulsive disorder. People with scrupulosity obsess about sin and thus feel a need to confess past sins over and over. They may fear that they have not confessed correctly or even doubt the mercy and love of God. But the Bible teaches us is that God is slow to anger and rich in mercy (Exodus 34:6).

If a person goes to confession and honestly confesses the sins he remembers, then his sins are forgiven. We all have left the confessional and then remembered something we should have said. As long as this was unintentional, we can trust in God's love and mercy and simply mention the sin at our next confession. God understands that we do not have a perfect memory. However, people who intentionally omit a sin are lying in the confessional and not showing true contrition, so their sins have not been confessed—and still need to be.

It's OK for people who don't have scrupulosity to recall past sins that they've confessed as long as doing so educates them on their weaknesses and sins and helps them avoid those sins in the future. However, people with scrupulosity should trust their confessor when he tells them they've completely confessed their sins and need not confess those sins any more.



St. Barnabas Connection: St. Patrick

This St. Patrick stain glass window is dedicated to the memory of Walter Desmond. Who was Walter Desmond and what was his role in St. Barnabas community?

Walter J. Desmond (February 3, 1876 – May 13, 1951) was a lawyer,
Postmaster, and Public Works
Commissioner in Long Beach, California
before serving as a Judge on the Los
Angeles Superior Court and the
California Court of Appeal.
Born to Irish immigrants in Worcester,
Massachusetts, Desmond graduated from
Harvard University in 1898 and Harvard



admitted to the <u>California State Bar</u> in February 1906, and opened a law office in town. When oil was discovered in <u>Signal Hill</u> in 1921, a large part of his practice was devoted to drawing oil leases. He served as Long Beach Postmaster and was later appointed Public Works Commissioner for the City of Long Beach.

He was appointed Judge in the Los Angeles Superior Court on August 3, 1927 and served until April 11, 1934, when he took an appointment as an <u>Associate Justice</u> for the California Court of Appeal. After serving for a little more than six months in that position, he accepted an appointment to return to the bench on the Los Angeles Superior Court on November 1, 1934. On January 2, 1943 he was appointed <u>Presiding Justice</u> of the California Court of Appeal, Second Appellate District, Division 3. He retired from the bench on July 1, 1948.

Desmond died at the age of 75 in Long Beach, California on May 13, 1951.

Walter and Mrs. Desmond were founding member of St. Barnabas. In fact, the first mass for St. Barnabas community was held in the Desmond home on Pacific Ave., and for the first year thereafter. They were also kind in offering their home to Father Foley until the rectory was built.

The <u>Knights of Columbus</u> Council #3449, located at 5459 Atlantic Avenue in Long Beach, is named after Judge Walter Desmond. Judge Desmond is a founding member of Knights of Columbus Council #987.

Today we still have members of the Desmond family as members of St. Barnabas Parish. Edith Daley is Judge Desmond's daughter and Christina Hansen Quinn is Judge Desmond's granddaughter.
